Children, adults and whanau live, learn, work, and play in environments that support water as the drink of choice.



Why Go the H2O – The challenges:

- High rates of overweight children and adults
- Drinking sweet drinks often is associated with health risks
- Sweet drinks are the leading contributor of total sugars for NZ children
- Hutt Valley children drink more fizzy than the national average
- Our kids are consuming a lot of sugar!

An urgent need to de-normalise this behaviour across multiple settings

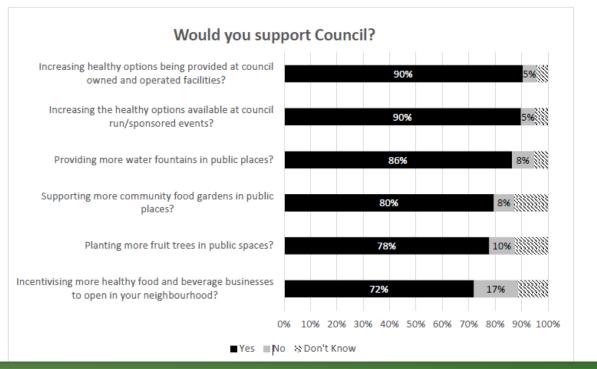
