Two years ago Rhode Street School in Hamilton, New Zealand, took up the opportunity to support 86-year-old, Avis Leeson and her vision to create sustainable orchards in every school in the Waikato. To date they have distributed over 1,500 apple, pear, plum and nectarine trees to over 200 ECE's, primary, intermediate, secondary and marae from Otara to Taumarunui. They plan to gift another 8,500 over the next three to five years.

Shane Ngatai, the principal and proud of it, will present a dynamic and informative Q&A for those interested in duplicating, supporting and learning from their kai sustainable journey.

Our philosophy is simple: A hand-up not a hand-out; teaching our children how to create a sustainable and authentic learning context around food security, biodiversity and community partnerships.

Fruit tree project

Pear trees ready for planting headed to schools around the Waikato on Monday. Almost 300 trees from McGrath Nurseries were collected from Rhode St School at the official launch of the Avis Leeson Fruit Tree Trust. Avis started helping schools with green-fingered skills in the late-2000s and has now handed the project on to Rhode St School and Melville Intermediate. Rhode St School principal Shane Ngatai said the trust's vision was to get 10,000 fruit trees into Waikato schools over the next 10 years. Citrus, plum, apple trees and more will likely take their place alongside the ears. Sir William Gallagher has come on board as patron of the trust, which also supported by various community organisations. Waikato Times notographer Christel Yardley went along to see the pupils at work.
